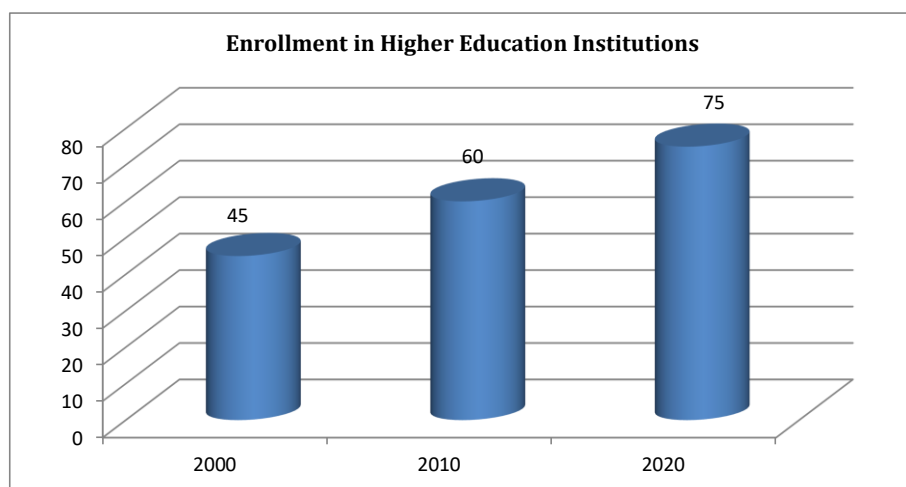

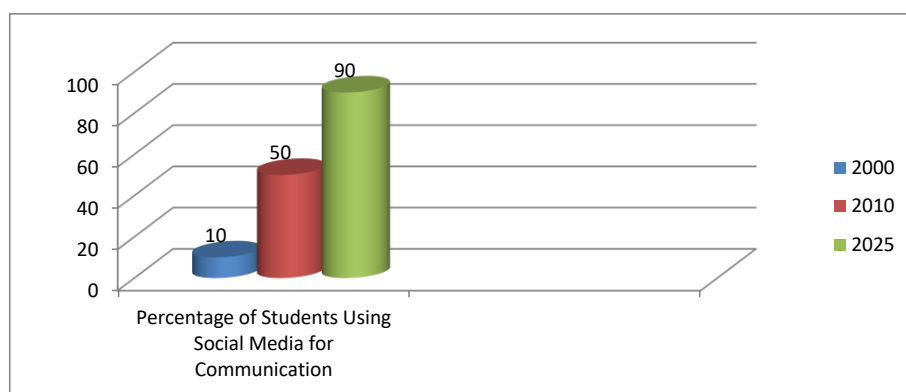

**Table 2:** Percentage of Students Using Social Media for Communication

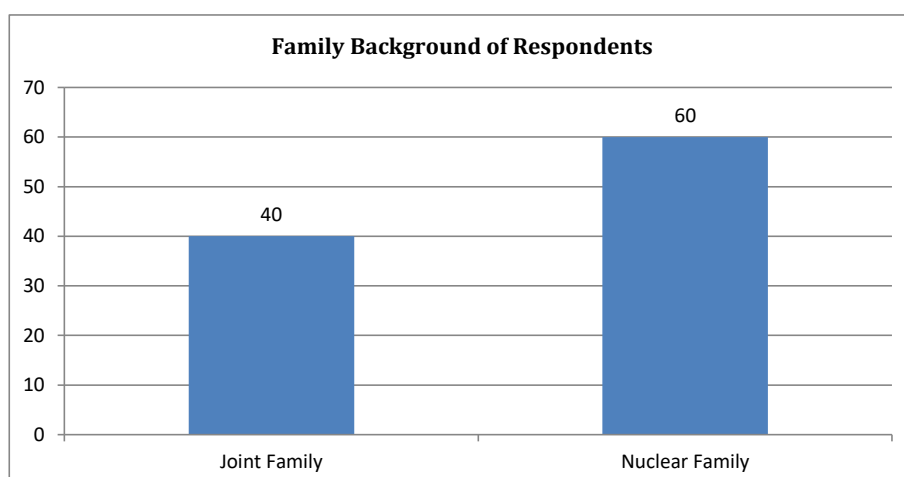

Nuclear Family	60%

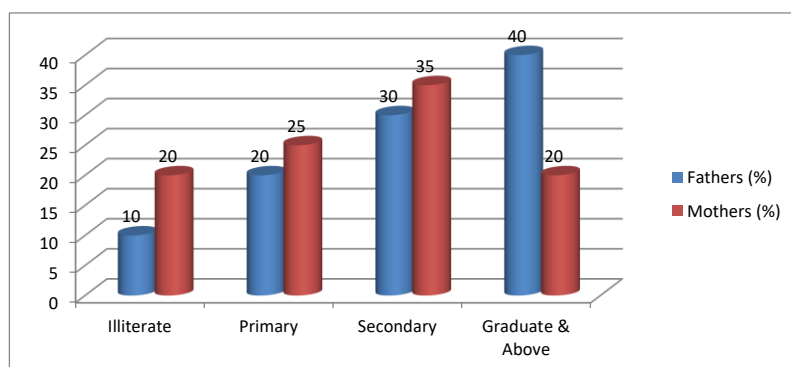


**ANALYSIS:**

**Table 4:** Education Level of Respondents' Parents

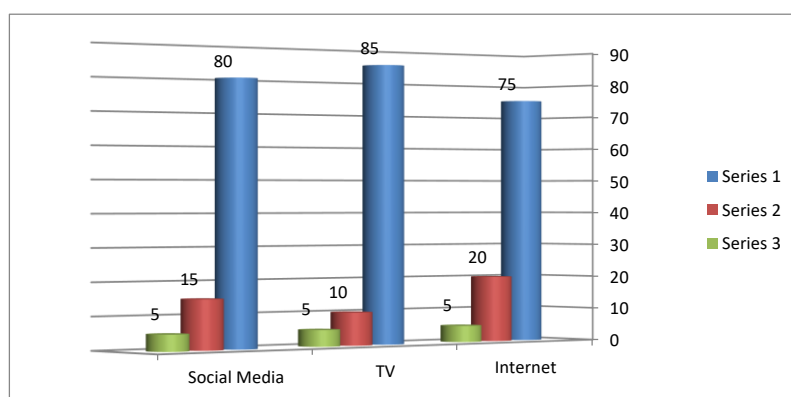

**Table 6:** Changes in Career Aspirations Due to Globalization

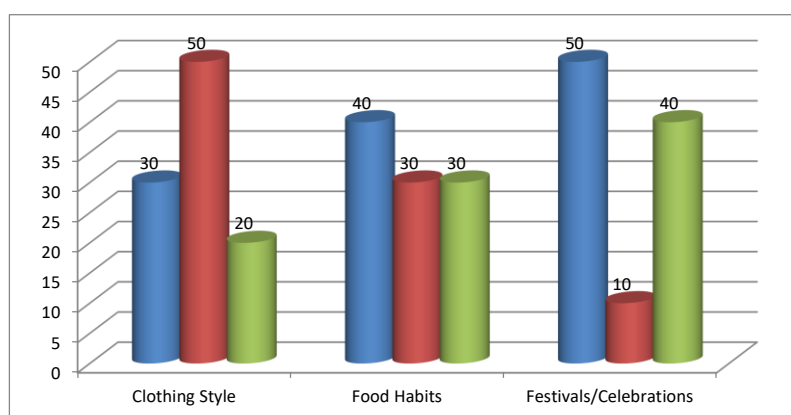

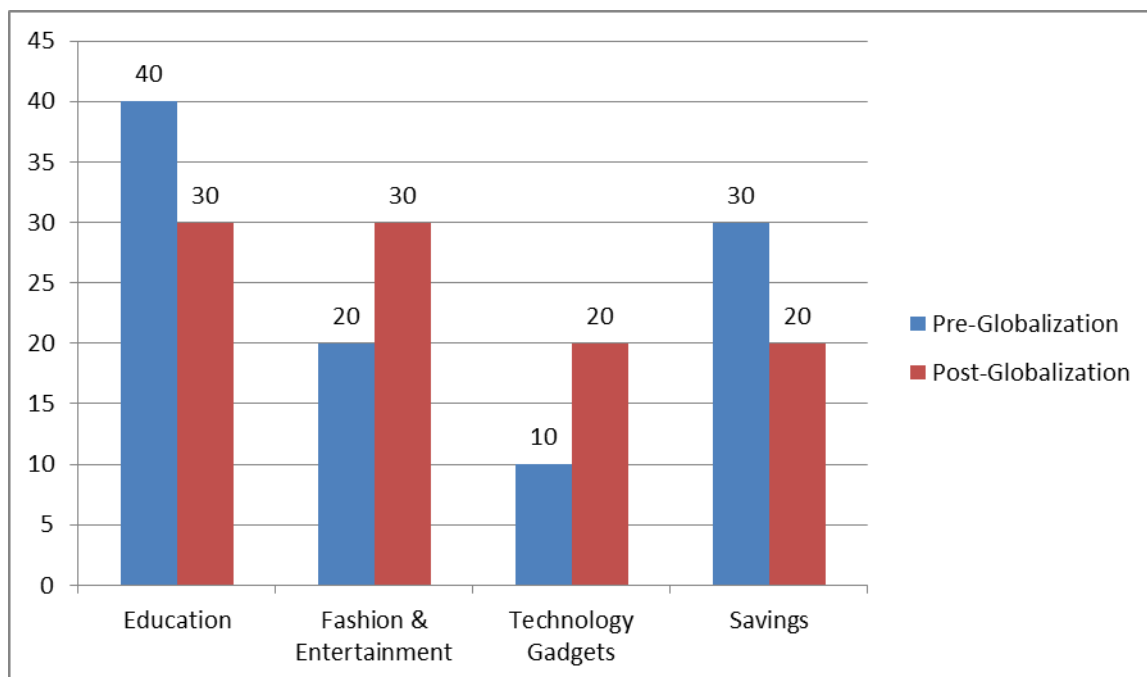

**Analysis:**

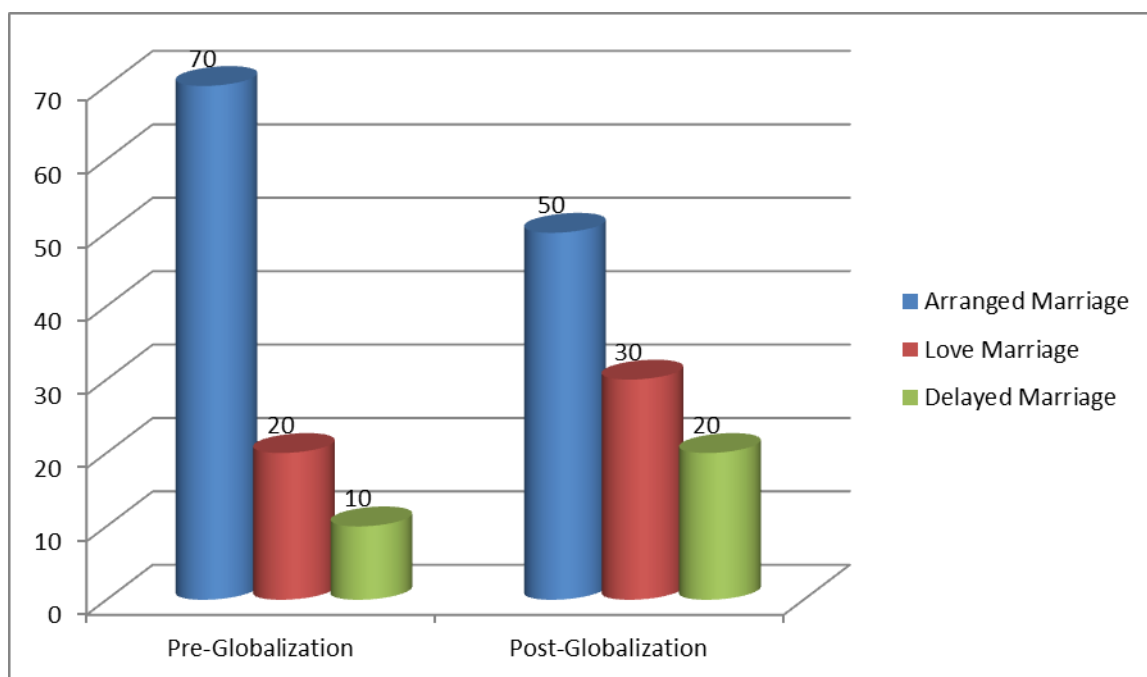
The increase in spending on fashion, entertainment, and technology (20% to 30%) suggests rising
